

Why Should We Become a Member of the Mulnivasi Sangh?

- 1. Mulnivasi Sangh is a national organization striving to establish a democratic society in India based on constitutional values - liberty, equality, fraternity, and justice for all citizens.**

- 3. The organization raises awareness among the majority communities who have been victims of the Brahmanical caste system and explains how their exclusion in their own land is part of a conspiracy by minority Aryan Brahmins, leading to mental and physical subjugation.**

Mulnivasi Sangh follows the legacy of great liberators like Tathagat Buddha, Mahatma Phule, Shahuji Maharaj, Narayana Guru, Birsa Munda, Ayothidas, Periyar Ramaswamy, and the architect of the Indian Constitution Dr. B.R. Ambedkar, aiming to free the people from poverty, deprivation, and helplessness.**
- 5. This is the only organization that not only fights for the real issues of the Mulnivasi Bahujan society but also directly challenges their ideological enemies - especially Brahmanism and Capitalism - proving and securing the rights of SC, ST, OBC, and minorities.**
- 6. It exposes the anti-people policies of ruling castes that, even after 70 years of independence, have left the Mulnivasi Bahujan society in multidimensional poverty and food insecurity.**
- 7. It actively resists the government's neglect in providing quality public healthcare and sanitation to the Mulnivasi society, fights against meager healthcare budgets, and opposes the push toward costly private hospitals inaccessible to the poor.**

- 8. Mulnivasi Sangh fights for quality, inclusive, and accessible education for all children and works to educate and skill the indigenous people.**
- 9. It demands increased public expenditure on education and opposes the Brahmanical domination in academic systems, curricula, and pedagogy.**
- 10. It resists unconstitutional economic policies of successive governments that prioritize growth rate over social justice and equality, which result in corporate development at the cost of widespread unemployment and deprivation among the indigenous people.**
- 11. It protests against government policies that snatch away the livelihoods of indigenous communities and hand over natural resources - water, forest, land, and minerals - to rich businessmen.**
- 12. It fights against Brahmanical patriarchy that imposes gender discrimination and subjugation of women and promotes the Phule-Ambedkarite model of gender equality and dignity for indigenous women.**
- 13. It promotes agricultural facilities for rural youth to encourage entrepreneurship and protect them from exploitation through cheap labor and lack of work opportunities.**
- 14. Mulnivasi Sangh struggles for full representation of the indigenous people in education, employment, bureaucracy, and higher judiciary - across all public domains as a fundamental constitutional right.**
- 15. It safeguards the secular fabric of the Constitution and exposes Brahmanical conspiracies that incite hate, division, and hostility among citizens, especially targeting Mulnivasi communities.**
- 16. It fosters scientific thinking and awareness among citizens, aiming to realize the highest potential of human capabilities and encouraging vigilance and resistance.**
- 17. It raises democratic consciousness among citizens and holds elected representatives**
